Thinking About The Future

Over the next few newsletters, our Independent Careers Advisor, Cathy, will be sharing simple and helpful information about what options are available to your child after they leave school. In this first update, Cathy focuses on what you can start thinking about now if your child is in Year 9 or Year 10.

As a parent or carer, you are likely to be one of the biggest influences in the decisions your child makes. You can support them by having regular, relaxed conversations about their future. This might include chatting about different kinds of jobs, including those you or other family members have done, or things you've seen together on TV or during trips out.

It also helps to talk positively about work experience that school has in place. It's a great way for learners to try something new, learn what they enjoy (or don't), and explore what kind of work environment suits them. It's also a chance for them to build confidence by learning they can face challenges and find support when needed.

You might also want to explore their hopes and dreams—what kind of job they might like, where they'd enjoy living, or what makes them feel excited about the future. Looking at local colleges together can also be helpful. These places can seem big and overwhelming at first, but learners are often based in smaller areas and supported by staff who get to know them, just like here. Colleges can also offer hands-on courses that schools don't provide.

Finally, when your child has an Annual Review with Ele, your involvement is really important. It helps make sure that their ideas and hopes for the future are part of their plan.

Indeed, incel culture is something designated safeguarding leads (DSLs) and school staff have been talking and learning about. Incel culture, the "manosphere", toxic masculinity, and the pervasiveness of internet content in young people's lives these days.

The crucial concept of contextual safeguarding is something all our staff, parents and carers should be aware of.

Until the release of this powerful drama, these topics hadn't really been discussed in depth in mainstream media nor understood by society.

Acceptance

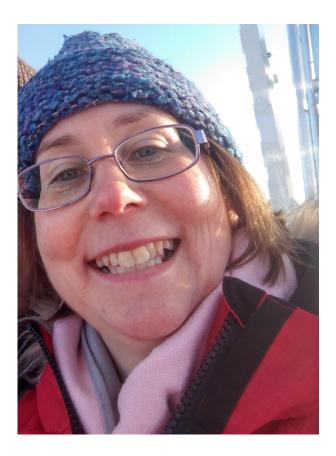
This week, we're thinking about the value of acceptance.
